#### In Search of Mr. Shaw

Sometimes it takes a while to settle in on a course. This contribution has touched on a number of aspects of Shawtown in the past, without really knowing who John Shaw was beyond being an escaped Revolutionary War POW. So many questions arise in considering this figure. Did he every marry? What was his trade? Who were his friends? How was he connected to the community? Where is his resting place? This will take some digging (couldn't resist the pun). And it is proving to be fun to see some connections between his story, the stories of those he may have known, and today's Scouts, Scouters and Scout Camps.

In late October of 1777 a group of "Convention Troops" were marched through northwestern CT on their way to Boston, having been captured in the Battle of Saratoga. And John Shaw was among them. Among them too, was a young man, very ill, named Abram Si Hunchupp (pronounced Sunchupp). The Convention Troops were camped on the Norfolk Green for a short time. As there were only 125 Convention Troops there, it is probable that Abram was well known to Shaw. When the march continued, Abram's illness prevented him from travelling further and he was taken into the home of one Mercy Lawrence Mills of Norfolk. She cared for him for a few weeks until his death. Abram was buried in Loon Meadow.

It is interesting to note that Camp Barbour sits on Loon Meadow Drive in Norfolk. Although the location of Abram's grave has long been lost, it is fun to think about its possible proximity to the camp. And the albeit loose connection to Shawtown. *The Sage*

Greetings and I wish you a happy and safe Thanksgiving and holiday season!

I am grateful to all of the Shawtown, Staff and OA volunteers who have worked tirelessly on the repairs to Calder Lodge and constructing the new pavilion at the shotgun range and so much more. Great people doing great things.

I would like to share another great happening for Camp Workcoeman. During the summer I had a conversation with a West Hill neighbor

who expressed her disappointment with not having the sights and sounds of our Scouts at camp. We also discussed the financial impact of not having a summer camp season. The neighbor suggested that I write a letter to the West Hill neighbors explaining our financial situation which I did. The neighbors graciously donated nearly \$7,000 which was used for basic expenses like water tests, the yearly testing of fire extinguishers and other seasonal expenses.

I'm sure that you recall we are slowly working on a new pavilion at the waterfront. We have not been able to proceed as planned because of limited grant funds that would not cover the total cost of the project. I shared this information with the West Hill neighbors, Michael Adams, Michael Samartino and Diane Libby, who are also the board members of the Robert Rosenheim Foundation. Their board considered our need and I am thrilled to say that the good

people of the Robert Rosenheim Foundation graciously presented a gift of \$100,000 to not only cover the cost to complete the project but also to create a restricted account with the balance of the funds to maintain the facility in the future.

This amazing gesture of generosity will make our plan of a learning center on the waterfront to become a reality!
